DON'T FORGET TO REMEMBER!

When you read this the holiday weekend will be past. Some will have vacationed, some will have worked, and some will have stayed at home, but most of us will have spent some time reflecting on the lives of those precious to us but no longer with us.

Memorial Day, originally called Decoration Day, is a day to remember those who have died in our nation's service. Decoration Day was officially proclaimed on May 5, 1868 and was first observed officially on May 30, 1868. The South did not observe that day but preferred to honor their dead on a separate day. Decoration Day was first observed when two women in Columbus, Mississippi placed flowers on Confederate AND Union graves. In 1882 the name was changed to Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were also honored. In 1971 Memorial Day was declared a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May.

DID YOU KNOW that at least 618,000 Americans died in the Civil War? Some experts say the toll reached 700,000. The number most quoted is 620,000. THAT, ON AMERICAN SOIL! That is a far cry from the 2,500 U.S. casualties sustained so far in the international conflict with Iraq. The battle of Tannenberg (Aug. 26-30, 1914) in the beginning of World War I, the Russians lost around 250,000 men, the Germans lost 20,000 and were able to take 92,000 prisoners. During the same war, 1914, in the Battle of the Marne along a 300 mile front the French lost 250,000 men and the Germans about the same. The British lost about 12,000 soldiers. Within months after the II World War ended in Europe, the official statistics of the Jews murdered in the Satanic Nazi "Final Solution" were 5,223,000. Without quoting statistics of the many wars the U.S. of America has been engaged in (Korean, Viet Nam, and others) we conclude that war is terrible and the cost of freedom is expensive. The human race has been in a continuous struggle between good and evil since the beginning of mankind, (Cain and Able), and later spiritual conflict between Ishmael and Isaac. That conflict continues unto this day and will do so until The Prince of Peace comes. Meanwhile the sacrifice of human life goes on. DON'T FORGET TO REMEMBER those who died in our behalf so that we might enjoy the luxury of freedom.

In family and non-military circles there are also the multitudes of loved ones that have ended their lives here on earth in some manner or other. We are constantly attending funerals of those dear to us. Remember them as well. Now DON'T FORGET TO REMEMBER that someday your and my pilgrimage on earth will also end. How will we be remembered? What is Culture Change/Resident Centered Care?

There has been a lot of talk and questions recently about Culture Change and Resident Centered Care and what that really means in a nursing home setting. These terms are used, often times interchangeably, leaving many staff and families wondering exactly what they mean and if they are the same thing or not. By using the term "Culture Change" it means to encompass the whole life in a nursing home. The term "culture" captures the totality of life within a particular environment (www.centeredcare.org). The Pioneer Network defines culture change as a transformative change that is anchored in values and beliefs that return control to elders and those who work closest to them. It has even been referred to by some as the act of humanizing the nursing home setting which has been very medical and sterile for a number of years. There is no single event or program that can be done to make a "Culture Change", it is a never-ending process that is always growing, changing and improving. Person Centered Care is a part of that change and process by making normal life the goal for those residents living there. To achieve this goal, nursing homes adjust care and routines to the resident, instead of the other way around (www.centeredcare.org). This means getting to know each resident's "Life Story" and making that a part of each day so they can feel at home and continue to live life to their own routine rather than that of someone else.

Also important in making Culture Change is staff. It is important to involve staff at all levels and from all areas to find out what they think will work and bring them into the decision making process. This adds a sense of value and ownership, which leads to more appreciation of all staff and more caring relationships with one another and residents. In forming neighborhoods, which have more consistent staffing, it enables staff and residents to form relationships that become a very important part of each other's lives. There is also a sense of teamwork with staff working together so that anyone can jump in and help without having a sense of being in someone else's territory. Elders are crying out for more care and less treatment in an environment that will nurture the human spirit (www.mibeam.org). Nursing homes are changing into personal communities, not wards or wings. They have private spaces and family places and a chance to continue to live life with some measure of independence and responsibility (www.culturechangenow.com).

Bill of Rights of Pleasant View Home

These rights were signed by the residents of Pleasant View Home or the residents DPOA. If at anytime the resident or DPOA need to discuss them, we ask that you speak to the Social Service Designee here at Pleasant View Home. This year we have 33 Bill of Rights to review: These are read and discussed at the resident council meeting the first of each month.

1. The Resident has a right to a dignified existence, self-determination, communication with and access to, persons and services inside and outside the Facility.
2. The Resident has a right to exercise his or her rights as a Resident of the Facility and as a citizen or resident of the United States.
3. The Resident has the right to be free of interference, coercion, discrimination, or reprisal from the Facility in exercising his or her rights.


